Global Grants Hub is an independent funding-opportunity and capacity-support platform established in 2023 and based in Kampala, Uganda. It helps organisations, students, entrepreneurs, community leaders and changemakers discover credible opportunities and prepare stronger applications.

The Hub brings together opportunity research, eligibility interpretation, structured publishing, donor mapping, concept and proposal development, budgeting, organisational readiness, training, mentorship, digital visibility and partnership support.

Its contribution is enabling: the applicant owns the idea, evidence, approvals and implementation. Donors and institutions retain full authority over eligibility, assessment and award decisions.

Across civil society, education, enterprise and community development, many capable people miss opportunities not because their ideas lack value, but because information is fragmented, donor language is difficult, deadlines are short and institutional documents are incomplete.

Global Grants Hub was founded in 2023 to bridge that gap through disciplined research, practical interpretation and technical support. Its origin is also personal: Richardson Kyeyune experienced early dependence on the support of NGOs and compassionate individuals after being orphaned in infancy. That experience shaped a lasting commitment to widen access to opportunity while protecting dignity and accountability.

VERIFICATION AND PUBLISHING STANDARD

Accuracy before urgency; clarity without rewriting the donor's rules.

VERIFICATION-FIRST PUBLISHING

No opportunity is treated as ready until its core facts can be traced to an official source.

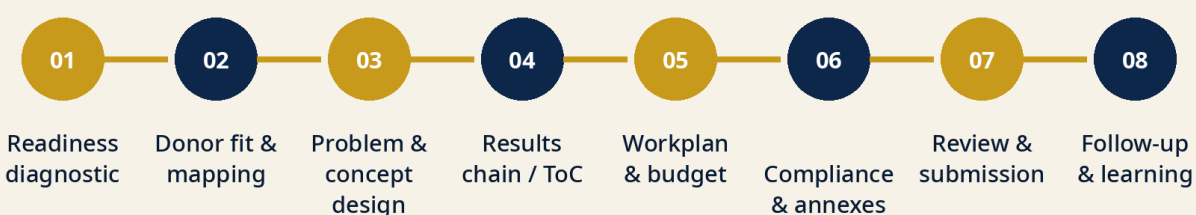

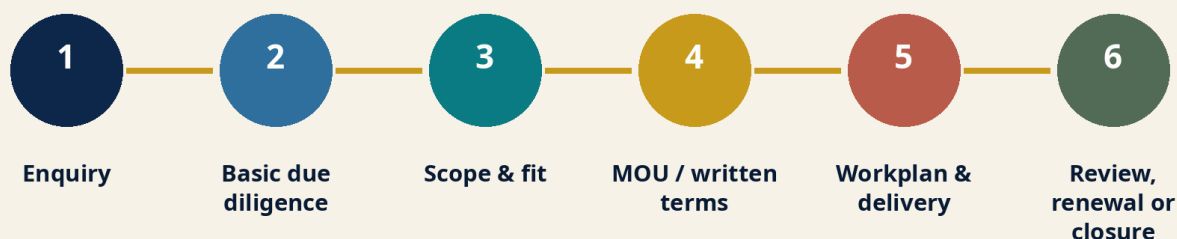

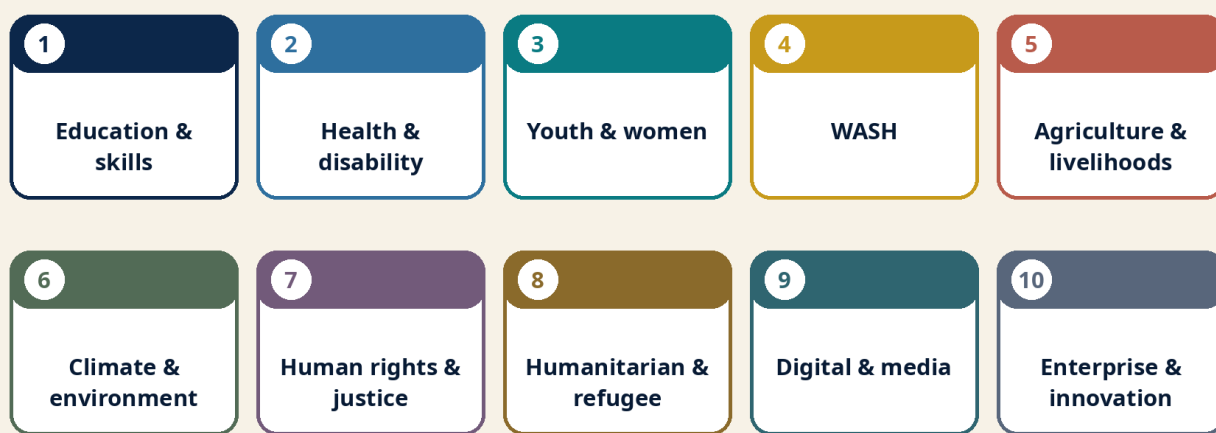

Profile

Richardson Kyeyune is a Uganda-based development practitioner working across opportunity research, proposal development, organisational readiness, strategic communication, youth engagement, community programming and digital systems.

He founded Global Grants Hub after repeatedly observing that strong grassroots organisations, students and changemakers were excluded by fragmented information, technical language, weak documentation and limited access to specialised support.

His early life also shaped the platform's purpose. Orphaned at nine months, he benefited from the support of NGOs and compassionate individuals who helped create educational opportunity. That experience informs his belief that access must be widened with dignity, honesty and responsibility.

Alongside Global Grants Hub, he serves as Chief Executive Officer of Cairo Youth Empowerment Initiative (CYEI) and Chief Operations Officer of Mission of Hope Initiative (MOHI), connecting technical work with practical community and institutional experience.

ABOUT THE TITLE "CHIEF"

Richardson Kyeyune is widely known professionally as Chief. The honorary title was given in recognition of his multi-sector community-impact work by Prince Mandla Napoleon Dlamini, traditional leader Chief Mnisi of Nkhaba Chiefdom, Eswatini. It is presented as a professional and honorary title, not as a hereditary or territorial authority claim.

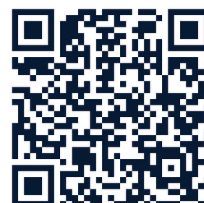
